As with the other sections we had had yet another busy year, although as you are aware it has been a challenge. The 2 sections run separate programs but share a leadership team, this has bought difficulties as the number of adults available has reduced due to university commitments and personal circumstances. Numbers at Scouts has seen a fall, however Explorers remain constant, and we continue to offer a varied program while working on Gold, Platinum and Diamond Chief Scouts Awards, with a number achieving these this year, alongside Bronze and Silver DofE, either through scouting or school.

The Explorer section has been working on links with other District units, had a number of joint evenings and taken part in the first District Explorer Camp. There have also been a shorter than normal summer camp this year at Rupert's Farm. We have done pioneering in both sections, working towards challenge badges and activity badges and continued to work on our basic scouting skills, such as hiking, camping, cooking and fire lighting. The Explorers have run evenings for the Scouts on values and ethics and we have had visitors, such as the Rector come and talk to the young people too. Once again, the sections have supported the local community by delivering Christmas Cards for the Parish.

Last Summer 2 of the Explorers attended International camps, with one attending the World Scout Jamboree and one going with a group of other Scouts and Explorers to Kenya to work on rebuilding a school and installing freshwater pumps. As a leader it is great to see these young people grow, develop and achieve and make these life changing trips and is a reward for giving up time for unit/troop evenings and meeting that is difficult to put into words. I would urge you all to consider if you could spare a few hours to help these young people who are trying to make a contribution to their community and ride the, often misplaced, criticism that they face and come and help with Scouts or Explorers, contributing to your community and enjoying the fun of working with young people to make a difference.
